

## Pastor David's Corner

I was walking into my gym one April morning getting buffeted by a cold north wind. I thought, "Ah, springtime in Michigan!"

Well, it is now late April. The wind is STILL blowing, and it is still not very warm. But we live in Michigan, and God is still in control, and He still loves us.

May is a month filled with memories. Mother's Day is the 2<sup>nd</sup> Sunday of the month. My mother lived to be 100 years, 7 months. She once told me that she didn't want to live to be 101. Close, but not quite.

I recognize that sometimes mothers are hard for children to understand (but usually so much easier than fathers are). They are so loving for some, so stern for others. Yet everyone has one. Maybe not always the sort of woman that God would love for us have, but at some point, the woman who gave you life was the woman God intended.

I still marvel at the words God spoke to Jeremiah: "Before I formed you in the womb I knew you; Before you were born I sanctified you; I ordained you a prophet to the nations."

And to Mary, "...the angel answered and said to her, "The Holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Highest will overshadow you; therefore, also, that Holy One who is to be born will be called the Son of God. Now indeed, Elizabeth your relative has also conceived a son in her old age; and this is now the sixth month for her who was called barren. For with God nothing will be impossible."

Then Mary said, "Behold the maidservant of the Lord! Let it be to me according to your word." And the angel departed from her."

These days our society seems to be all concerned about reproductive rights and birth control and sexual disease prevention – and we think nothing about God's intention and God's purposes. I shudder to think about what we will face when we stand before God and answer for all the deeds of our lives. Perhaps we need to consider more about asking God before we put our own wants ahead of His will.

So, as we remember our own mothers on the 11th of May 2025, consider that God is in control of our universe – but often only as far as we allow Him to work in our portion of it. He chose your mother. Give Him the praise due Him and thank God for your mother. Often praising God releases His grace on us all – even (or perhaps, especially) when we don't deserve it.

#### **Mission and Outreach Notes for May**

## **District Superintendent Announced**

### **Rev. John Kasper named to East Winds District**

LANSING MI...Bishop David A. Bard announces to the Michigan Conference the appointment of the Reverend John Kasper as district superintendent of the East Winds District, effective July 1, 2025. Rev. Kasper is currently serving as the district superintendent of the Central Bay District. He will follow the Rev. Dr. Margie Crawford, who has been a district superintendent since 2018. Rev. Dr. Crawford has been appointed as pastor of Northville United Methodist Church, effective July 1.

With Rev. Kasper serving as superintendent of two districts, Bishop Bard also announces the appointment of the Rev. John Hice as half-time assistant to the East Winds District Superintendent, effective July 1. Rev. Hice is being appointed as a retired elder. Immediately preceding his retirement, Rev. Hice served as district superintendent for the East Winds District. It is expected that this appointment will continue through the end of 2025.

Bishop Bard is making these appointments in light of likely changes to the Michigan Conference budget. Bishop Bard: "Even though finances play a significant role in these decisions, I am pleased that our current cabinet is willing to think creatively about superintending moving into the future. We will continue to think and imagine new ways of fulfilling our Disciplinary responsibilities while helping the churches of our conference explore unique ways to grow in vital mission and ministry. I am very grateful to Rev. Kasper and Rev. Hice for their willingness to assume new responsibilities."

Bishop Bard said: "Making a new appointment to the cabinet is always a joy, and always also means a loss. The Rev. Dr. Margie Crawford has served as a district superintendent faithfully and well. Her ministry in both the Western Waters and East Winds districts has been deeply appreciated. She has served with her keen mind, out of her deep faith and love for the church. She has cared deeply about the congregations and clergy under her care. Her cabinet colleagues and I will miss her."

The 2026 budget proposal, if approved, will provide funds for five district superintendents for the Michigan Conference. Bishop Bard will work with the cabinet and other conference leaders on a plan for superintending and districts to be proposed to the 2026 annual conference session. "We will want to think in new and creative ways about how our annual conference provides support for and supervision of our clergy and how we can encourage and provide resources for local congregations and ministries as they seek to be vibrant places for the ministry of making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world."



#### **Reflecting on resurrection**

In *Rest Your Dreams on a Little Twig*, poet Joyce Rupp finds in spring flowers the proclamation of the gospel: "we who have died / are alive today." In another poem in the same volume, she writes: "A green shoot grows / out of an old tree stump, / announcing to the world / that power lies within death."

As you move about outdoors these springtime days in the northern hemisphere, where do you see nature testifying to resurrection? Where is evidence that what seemed dead — bare branches, dry grass, inactive seeds — was not in fact the final word? What encourages you to believe in renewal, second chances, life that blossoms from death? In what ways are you, who had died, alive today? Part of your life that felt like an old stump might be sprouting green shoots after all!
